We were saddened to hear of "OJ's" passing. Please remember that God is too wise to make a mistake and too Holy to do anything wrong. Prayer is the key, but it takes Faith to unlock the door. We really feel as if we lost one of our blood brothers.

In 1953. when I moved from Raeford, NC. to Durham, the Williams Family was one of the first families that I met. Mr. Oscar and Mrs. Edith welcomed me into their home and treated me as if I was one of their very own. Mabel, Chester, and Patricia treated me the same. OJ was one of my road partners.

OJ and I covered many miles, and I got to know him and learned that he was one of the kindest man that I had ever met. He would give you the shirt off of his back, and he did not like a lot of fan fair. OJ was a quiet person, and he would not only help his family and friends, but he would also help anyone that needed his help, and you would never hear anything about it.

OJ and I were blessed to have been taught and coached by two legions: the late Russell Blount and the late Herman Riddick. OJ and I followed those Eagles for over 40 years. We would also attend the CIAA Basketball Tournaments. OJ was an excellent athlete. He played football at Hillside, and after graduation in the class of 1958, he joined the Navy. In 1960, he enrolled at North Carolina College, which is now North Carolina Central University, and graduated in 1964 with a degree in Physical Education. In 1964, OJ began his teaching career in Chase City, VA. He left there and moved to New Carrollton, MD, and taught in the Landover, MD. School system where he retired after 30 years of service. After retirement, he worked at a group home in Anderson, SC. OJ moved to join Chester.

OJ played the position of End at NCCU on two Football championship teams in 1961 and 1963, where he was recruited by Coach Herman Riddick. He was also a Boy Scout under the leadership of the late Mr. Kelly Bryant, Scout Master. OJ rose to the level of a Eagle Scout.

I will say to the Family that to show your love and respect for OJ is to continue his legacy by continuing to spread the love and respect and willing to help others.
